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# Hitchcock's Music



## Synopsis

For half a century Alfred Hitchcock created films full of gripping and memorable music. Over his long career he presided over more musical styles than any director in history and ultimately changed how we think about film music. This book is the first to fully explore the essential role music played in the movies of Alfred Hitchcock. Based on extensive interviews with composers, writers, and actors, and research in rare archives, Jack Sullivan discusses how Hitchcock used music to influence the atmosphere, characterization, and even storylines of his films. Sullivan examines the director's important relationships with various composers, especially Bernard Herrmann, and tells the stories behind the musical decisions. Covering the whole of the director's career, from the early British works up to *Family Plot*, this engaging look at the work of Alfred Hitchcock offers new insight into his achievement and genius and changes the way we watch and listen to his movies.

Other reviewers have noted a few 'flaws' in the books precision, and those few are indeed there, BUT those mistakes are VERY MINOR, and few and far between - this is a fantastic wild ride read from cover to cover, offering TONS of authentic situations, behind the scene scenarios, and in-depth detailed information. This author KNOWS music and film music (and contemporary music) and he knows Hitchcock, and the resultant fusion is terrific. I teach university film music graduate seminars and I find this book an absolute read for the students.

Jack Sullivan is definitely a good writer, has definitely done worthwhile important and original research here, is definitely passionate about the subject, etc., etc., etc.BUT.....silly errors abound in his study: he quotes "David Raskin"--sorry, Jack it's RAKSIN....He mentions the "The most famous cue in movie history, "The Knife" in Psycho's shower scene"---wrong again Jack, the cue is titled

"The Murder." AND when you dig deeper you find even more disturbing errors, e.g. claiming Hitchcock "hadn't wanted any music in the opening hotel sequence" of Psycho because "evidence comes from the screenplay, which describes only traffic noises." ---Jack, Hitchcock ALMOST NEVER indicated music placement in his screenplays! That's WHY he created separate "Music Notes" for his films! I caught these errors in a casual reading and unfortunately it makes me question how many OTHER mistakes there are in this book. So unfortunately I'd have to give Jack Sullivan an A for effort and a C for results--the study is (albeit unintentionally) seriously flawed.

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
