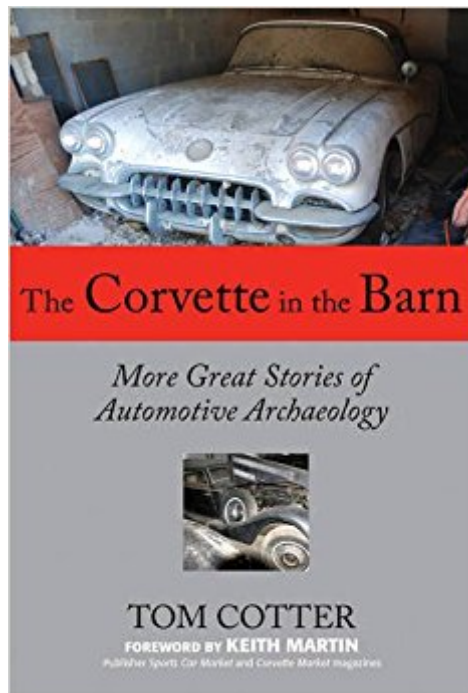

Back up a bit the series really began because Cotter loves cars, and, like most of us who do, he dreamt of finding one in an old barn. He gathered all the stories he could find about such lost cars in his 2005 book, *The Cobra in the Barn*. The book became a national phenomenon that resonated with car buffs around the world. Cotter followed up with two other wildly popular books, *The Hemi in the Barn* and *The Vincent in the Barn*. I bought Corvette in the Barn on the strength of how much I enjoyed Cobra and Hemi in the Barn. The book almost lived up to my expectations and was a good read, however, I noticed a few typos and a pair of mixed up pictures, which smacks a little of the book being rushed into production one final proof reading short. I also felt that about ~20% of the stories were a bit 'flat' - like they only got printed due to a lack of better material to fill the space. Don't get me wrong - I certainly enjoyed the

book, and it is a good addition to the series, but not quite in the same league as the previous two. If you enjoyed Cobra and Hemi, then I would definitely recommend this one. I just hope that any future books in the series up the ante a little.

By far the best series of books on the topic of Barn-found automotive treasures. These books took a smoldering niche in the car collecting hobby, and ignited one of the hottest crazes ever in the classic car world. Cotter brought a topic that most gearheads have always found intriguing, into the mainstream. Anyone, from the casual car show attendee to the most serious of collectors, will enjoy the fascinating stories that he tells of finding automotive riches, and usually the history of previous ownership and the how or why these highly sought-after automobiles end up in these less-than-desireable resting places. Believe me, a truly great read.

In the second of his series, Tom Cotter (note to , Keith Martin is not the author, he wrote the forward) tells us more stories of people who have had the good luck to find some great old cars. Some cars are valuable, some are not, some the finder can't keep or restore because of their high value, but even the search can be fun. I like it because you can read just a few stories at a time. It's a great "put down and pick up later" book. The only fault I can find is it may make you awfully envious about the luck some guys have in finding (and owning) the cars.

My brother had an older Corvette which he recently sold. He loves old cars, and I got this for him for Christmas. He just loved it, and spent a lot of time looking thru it as we were opening all our gifts.

You might think a barn find book would get a bit repetitive after the fourth or fifth Cobra or Hemi. But Tom mixes it up with stories of all different kinds of cars, trucks, hidden troves and even car parts. It's easy to get infected with barn find fever after reading these fun stories!

Great stories about cars and people that were forgotten but found new life when someone drags them out of the dust. Easy, relaxed writing that makes you feel like you are at a dinner eating breakfast with your best friends talking cars and life. I have the whole series and will keep buying 'em long as they write 'em. I like digital books but this is the kind you need to turn the pages.
